Registration and Officers and Board Members Meeting will be held on June 19 in the evening. June 20 will be our "in house" meeting, 9:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. or possibly later, so try to be flexible on your evening plans! - See Cain Ridge meeting house where the Great Revival of 1800 began
- Visit Runnymeade Horse Farm near Paris, which is also where Cooper's Run Baptist Church is located, where James Fry and his wife, Nancy Spears, attended in the late 1700s
- See the Jacob Spears mansion and cemetery and the Ewait farm along Coopers Run near where the Frys also lived
- Visit the Duncan Tavern in Paris, which accommodated travelers in the late 1700s.

- Drive by Queen Elizabeth's stables and horse farm
- Possibly see the location of the homestead of Old Ben's youngest son, William, who died in 1796



Janet Frye Steele's father Billy Wayne Frye passed away at home on January 7, 2018, at the age of 89, being born on July 1, 1928, in Oak Hill, West Virginia. He was active until the day he died without being hospitalized or placed in assisted living or a nursing home. His heart just gave out.

Isaac Frye, 70, died on the morning of June 6th at Boone Hospital Center in Columbia, Missouri, surrounded by family and friends.

Isaac Frye met his wife, Toni Hampton, during college, and he often said she caught his eve right away. He married Toni in 1968, starting a 50-year adventure that included having three children and living all around the world, including North Carolina; Panama City, Panama; Colorado; Seoul, South Korea; and Illinois before settling in Cairo, Missouri, in 1991. Isaac was always active with a true appreciation for athleticism. He ran, coached, and officiated a number of sports games throughout his life. His life was full of stories about family and friends, whom he always cherished.

Missionary in China

Sonja Patrice Green Itson Writes About Her Great-Aunt



Harriet Laura Frazey was born on June 29, 1879, in Chautauqua County, Kansas, USA, daughter of John Tyler Frazey and Harriet Emily Dikeman. Harriet Laura Frazey, who was called Laura by her family and friends, died on September 20, 1932, at the age of 53, in Foochow, China. She was buried in the American Cemetery in Foochow, China. She never married and did not have any children. Her grandmother was Amanda Fry Dikeman, and her great-grandfather was Andrew Jackson Fry.

Laura was a missionary and teacher in China. Laura brought gifts back from China on a furlough and included some for the family of her sister Sarah Frazey Mills (my grandmother). Although my mother could not have had much direct contact with her, Laura obviously had been her favorite aunt. My mother had received a pair of Chinese slippers, which she wore until she grew out of them. Then she put them away until she married and had a daughter, me, whose feet could fit the

slippers. Unfortunately, two sets of feet and a quarter of a century took a toll on the embroidered silk. Some of Laura's memorabilia did survive and today are in my possession. Laura sent letters to her sister Sarah and Sarah's daughters, Gladys (my mother), Esther, and Myra. When China began reopening its borders to Westerners in the late 1970s, my mother said that she wanted to see where her Aunt Laura had spent so many years and was buried. At that time, Foochow was not open to tourists, but in 1980, my mother and I were able to travel through several regions of China, visiting cities and farms, factories and schools, temples and theaters, many of which had not changed in the intervening 50 years.

Laura was quite the letter writer during all her years in China. There is an original letter from 1916 in the family records that describes Christmas in China at the missionary station. There are also several transcripts of



her later correspondences. Laura wrote a letter dated February 7, 1926, to my Grandmother Sarah.

I am in Foochow temporarily. I came down three days ago to attend a business meeting of our Missionary Society. Conditions on the way were more normal than I've seen in several years. The government authorities have at last begun to bestir themselves to capture bandits. Some 200 captured bandits

have lost their heads during the last six weeks, and conditions are much better than usual. I'm in the home of a Methodist preacher (Chinese, of course). They have some dear children. who have been blowing soap bubbles like American children might. Well, I didn't see any bandits on my way as I came out yesterday. What I did see were men carrying loads swung from either side of a stick, men working on the new bridges and new auto road. It will be a wonderful day when that road gets done and we can get out to this river in autos instead of slow-going sedan chairs. I



walked eight or ten miles yesterday but not all in one stretch. The whole journey was about twenty-seven miles. I also saw a man with a bamboo switch driving forty or fifty ducks along the road.

In an addendum, dated August 4, Laura specifically asked my mother, Gladys, about her career goals and about her brothers. Laura died a few years after this was written.

Laura must have been a very strong woman to have traveled the world, lived in China for 15 years, returned home to take care of her aged parents, run the family farm after her father died, and finally traveled back to China after her mother passed away. Also, Laura had sailed on the S.S. Lusitania from Liverpool, England, arriving in New York, New York, on December 19, 1913, about a year and a half before Germany sank the ship. Laura has been such a pleasure to research and to prove out the family stories because of the many documented records her travels had left.

One family story was that Laura had died after eating a "hundred-year-old" buried egg, contracting appendicitis. I am not sure how the family connected eating this notable style of egg to her death while Laura's death record states the cause of death as gangrenous appendicitis, complicated by subphrenic abscess and general peritonitis. I must admit that, when offered this delicacy in China, knowing that it was nowhere that old, neither my mother nor I tried one. Our Chinese guides were very appreciative to have an extra helping each.

LAURA FRAZEY DIES IN CHINA

Nickerson Woman, Missionary In Orient, Dead at Foochow, Cablegram Announces.

Word was received here last evening of the death of Misa Laura Frazey, 52, of Nickerson who died in Foochow, China where she has been a missionary for many years. She was supported in the mission field by the Women's Foreign Missionary societies of the Southwest Kansas Methodist conference.

Miss Francy was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Frazey, Nickerson. She had been back in China for just a year, following a furlough spent in the United States, the greater part at the home of her parents, both of whom died while their daughter was with them.

She is survived by three sisters: Mrs. Anna Johnson, Bylvia: Mrs. Olive Kresch, Enterprise, and Miss Florence Frazey of Nickerson and two brothers, Victor Frazey of Nickerson and James Frazey of Wichita.

Miss Frasey was serving her fourth term as head of the district mission schools in the Kutlen district at the time of her death,

Froman is the Name

Doing genealogy research is often confusing. It seems as if our family files are full of names like



Benjamin, Abraham, Elizabeth, and Sarah. But whenever I am noodling through lists of names, I always like to run across the name Froman. When I see it, I know that it is someone I am related to. It doesn't matter if Froman is the last name, first name, or middle name; it belongs to a family member.

John Paul Froman, Sr., was born in 1708 in Germany and died in 1783 in Virginia. It seems that anyone named Froman can trace lineage back to him. In fact, he is my 5th great-grandfather. He was married to Elizabeth Hite, the eldest daughter of Yost Hite, the wealthy Virginia land owner. From them, all people named Froman seem to come.

My files boast over 400 descendants of John Paul Froman and Elizabeth Hite. Anyone in HFFA who has found that his or her lineage includes a member of the Speers (Spears, Speer, Spear) family is also a Froman. Six children of Henry Speers and Regina Froman married into the Frye (Frey, Fry) family. Regina Froman Speers was the eldest daughter of John Paul Froman and Elizabeth Hite.

Sometimes the name Froman shows up as a first name: for example, Froman Speers

(1870-1944) and Froman Fry (1819-1889). Froman Fry's mother was Sarah Froman, and his wife was Louvina Froman, daughter of Elijah W. Froman.

There are also Froman J. Alexander; Froman Cooper Baker; Froman Lester Fry; Froman Lester Fry, Jr.; Christina Froman Overall; John Froman Overall, Sr.; and John Froman Overall, Jr., as well as his mother, Maria Christina Froman. In addition, there are Peter Froman Reasoner and Royal Froman Reasoner.

I thought of the importance of the name Froman recently when I ran across the mention of sing-

er Jane Froman.
As soon as I
saw that name,
I knew we were
related. It turns
out that she is
my 5th cousin,
once removed.
But I had never



heard of her before, so I wondered, "Who is this "singer?" Quickly turning to Wikipedia, I was completely surprised about this "unknown singer." Her real name is Ellen Jane Froman (1907-1980) from Missouri. Her father was Elmer Ellsworth Froman. Jane has three stars on the Hollywood Walk of Fame for her show business career. She was a recording artist and had her own radio show as well as appearing in TV shows and performing on Broadway, including in the Ziegfeld Follies. She also appeared in three movies. However, the biggest part of her career was starring in her nightclub act. There was even a movie about her life, starring Susan Hayward as Jane Froman but with Jane doing all the singing in the movie.

The inspiration for the movie With a Song in my Heart comes from a devastating plane acci-

dent in 1943 in Portugal while Jane Froman was heading to a USO show with 37 others. She was one of only 15 survivors from



the crash. She sustained many severe injuries that almost led to the amputation of a leg. She was in rehabilitation the rest of her life, even when she resumed her career. In less than a year, however, she returned to Broadway wearing a heavy leg brace and using a wheelchair. Overall, she had 39 operations in her lifetime, but she continued to perform.

Billy Rose, the famous composer and producer, was once asked to name his 10 favorite female singers. He is reported to have said, "Jane Froman and nine others." After I read about her, my mind was overwhelmed. Many times, I listen to music from the 1920s, 1930s. 1940s, and 1950s; but I had never heard of her. Now that I've read her biography and listened to her remastered CDs. I agree that she is as good as Billy Rose said she was. And Froman is her name.
