Hello to our Cousins, Kin, and Other Readers,

In the November Newsletter, I mentioned that I signed up for DNA testing with FamilyTreeDNA.com. There were a lot of offerings. I chose the 67 marker test for Y-DNA (father, grandfather, great grandfather, etc) AND the mtDNA (mother, grandmother, great grandmother, etc.)

So far there have been NO matches on the Y-DNA test. Other members have had good success with this test, but not me, yet.

On the mtDNA test I have thousands of matches. BUT, we are informed (and warned) that this test can go back 52

generations or more for a match. That would take us into the Dark Ages.

I have been in contact with some of the people with whom I have a match. So far our family lines do not seem to link up. Apparently, I am in something called HAPLO Group K, which covers most of Europe with threads that extend into Russia, Mongolia, and other distant places. Most of the Ashkenazi Jews are in HAPLO Group K and I have been in contact with someone from that faith. Another respondent has family lines originating in Gdansk, Poland. Another person can trace their maternal side back 500 years, entirely in Iceland.

My mother's, mother side is French Canadian. There might be a lot of matches, but it doesn't look like they will be easy to trace.

Trying to find the link for these diverse groups of people will require much research and a lot of luck.

On my father's father side (the Speers) an interesting revelation has occurred. I had always considered the Speers to be of German origin. The Y-DNA test indicates a stronger link to Britain, Ireland, and Scotland with only a weak link to Germany. I'm hoping to eventually be informed of a match on the Y-DNA test.

I BEQUEATH

Everyone who has done much genealogical research has run into apparent dead ends. We cannot find a document we KNOW exists and we know WHERE it should be. A brick wall! Frustration!

Some few years ago, my brother was traveling through a rural county in a state where some of our ancestors had lived five generations ago. (Names and places have been fictionalized to protect the ignorant.) It was midday on a Friday when he reached the county courthouse where he believed some of our ancestors would have records. Among others, he thought an ancestor's will was probated in this county.

The records were scattered in three different courthouse annexes (really, separate buildings) and it was a tedious search. Shortly before the offices closed, he picked up an index to probate records and checked its entries. To his great delight, our g-g-g-grandfather's name appeared. His will had been submitted and scheduled for probate! Brother requested a copy and was told to go to another annex, pick up the copy, and return to that office to make payment.

He quickly raced back and forth over a twoblock span, barely beating the clock. When he actually got a chance to read what he was given, it was just the probate court minutes, not the transcript of the will he was hoping for. The courthouse was now closed!

On Monday, brother returned to the county courthouse and sought out the clerk who had made the copy. He told her he needed the transcript of the actual will. The clerk assured him they did not keep "things like that" in their county.

Searching about to find some sort of way to find the sought after document, Brother asked her to tell him about what records they did have. She then launched into a detailed dissertation on what all she had accomplished in her six year tenure, unboxing, examining, sorting, filing, and making available records that had not been accessed in years etc, etc, etc.

Brother told her proudly that our family had been pioneers and involved in establishing that county many years ago. And he had hoped to find the contents of g-g-g-grandfather's will. He told her that her records showed the will had been probated in that county. He then described just what he was looking for and said the will probably began with "I, ______, being of sound mind, do bequeath the following . . ." She replied, "Oh, then, you probably would be interested in the 'Bequeath Book'."

Yes!! The will was there!

So. . . if you are running into dead ends at courthouses, maybe you need to re-think your request. Think in the terms of someone who has no idea about probate and wills, but who does know the records in her safekeeping, and that some of the records in her custody begin with the words: "I BEQUEATH. . ."

DESTINED TO BE A JUDGE

I am sure we were all saddened by the death of the Georgian luge participant in the recent Olympics. One of our cousins, Mark Friden of Star Lake, NY is an international and Olympic level luge official. Unfortunately, he was not chosen for this year's Olympics, but perhaps he will in some future Olympiad.

Recently Mark was asked by a local reporter about judging luge competition. He pointed out that it is not subjective like figure skating but is gravity driven. Winners are determined by their times. As an official, his responsibilities require record keeping and making sure the rules are followed so that all athletes compete on an equal basis. Mark says, "We measure the temperature of the runners, weigh the sleds, weigh the athletes, take measurements of the sleds, make sure there's no special advantages in any area. Like any sport, there are opportunities where people can cheat. The luge officials try to eliminate those opportunities."

Mark has led an interesting life that included being employed for many years by Western and Delta Airlines with all the travel perks. He has been a competitive figure skater as well as a judge, accountant, and referee at figure skating competitions. He was a rodeo competitor (bull riding, steer wrestling, and calf roping) and later became a rodeo judge.

When he moved to Star Lake, which is 70 miles from Lake Placid, NY (the home of two Winter Olympics), he became a judge for luge. He hopes to start training to be a bobsled and skeleton official next year.

He worked for ABC Television as a consultant at major figure skating championships for five years, including the 1984 Olympic Winter Games in Sarajevo.

Aside from being the town judge for Clifton, NY, and serving on many local boards (library and hospital boards for example) he is on the Board of the Library Trustees Association of New York State.

Here is another FACTOID from my own heritage. Henry Speers and Rebecca Frye had 13 children. Usually, from such a list, only one of the children can be listed as one of your direct ancestors. In this case, however, I can claim that three of their children are in my direct line of ancestry.

Catherine Speers md John McCrory

Noah, the son of Apollos md his first cousin Sarah Amanda Ward, the daughter of Pleasant. In those days that was not particularly unusual. It has happened in many of our families.

Catherine's great granddaughter, Margaret Torrance McClain md her 2nd cousin, once removed, Van Lawrence Speers. He was the son of Noah and Sarah, mentioned above.

Thus, siblings Apollos, Pleasant, and Catherine are in my direct line of ancestors.

PRODIGY LEADS TO ANCESTRY

As a child, I remember talking to my father's oldest sister, Aunt Genevieve. She would tell me about being raised in Breckenridge, Colorado with her extended Frey relatives. Unfortunately, I was too young to realize that I should have written these important facts down. Aunt Genevieve died in 1964 and my dad died only 2 years later. Several years after that I remember talking to my mother's great aunt Gertrude Cossitt about her Cossitt family. Again, I failed to write anything down.

I got my first home computer around 1990 and when it first became available, signed up for the online program called Prodigy. One day, while on Prodigy, I saw an advertisement for Family Tree Maker. It looked interesting and I placed an order.

That got me started with my genealogy research.

My first data came from inquiries with living relatives. After that I had to do research of birth, death and marriage records along with information on grave markers as well as contacting funeral homes to see what information they got from family members at the time of a death.

Since my last name is Frey, I was very curious about my Frey ancestors. For many years I was up against a brick wall once I got to my great grandfather Smith Frey. A 2nd cousin and I who were doing similar research came to the conclusion that he must have died between 1880 when the census was taken and 1885 when his wife remarried. Since the first name of Smith is quite unusual, I continued to Google the name with the hope that something would come up on him. Nothing ever did. About two years ago, this 2nd cousin found a Smith Frey in the 1900 census for Sedgwick County, Colorado. The year and state of birth matches, but the occupation was different. Further research confirmed that this was, in fact, my great grandfather. He and my great grandmother had been divorced and he moved with his new wife to a different part of Colorado.

I now knew a little more of my Frey ancestors, but going back only 3 or 4 generations was not enough. That is why I had Family Tree DNA conduct tests on me. These test results linked me with a distant cousin, **Bruce Frey** who lives in Ohio. Cousin Bruce then showed me where I fit in the line of descendents of Heinrich Frey.

As for my mother's Cossitt ancestors, I found the Cossitt Family Association around 2000 with a simple Google search. Currently I am the Treasurer of this Association and their Webmaster.

Just think what that one advertisement on Prodigy started for me. I have not only purchased 6 different upgrade versions of Family Tree Maker, I will probably be purchasing their next version that comes out and is compatible with Windows 7 as I recently upgraded to that operating system.
