Travels: In recent issues of the Newsletter we have been keeping tabs on those who travel. Of course, no one can keep up with our President, Gene Frye, who travels for a living. But it seems some of our members are getting around on their own. Here are some more in this series.

Falls Church to Stonehenge

Since the Winchester reunion in 2011, my daughter Natalie Grace Frye and I have traveled to England and Scotland (including an after-hours, beyond-the-chains tour of Stonehenge); Madrid, Cordoba & Granada; and Montreal & Mont St. Laurent. Over the years I've been fortunate to travel and work in 6 continents and to live briefly in Paris. Highlights include visiting Hungary when it was still part of the Warsaw Pact, being in Hong Kong in 1997 when the British handed it over to China, and being in Moscow in 1993 when there was an attempted coup and three days of fighting in the streets.

Panama

After swearing I would not get on an airplane again, I was persuaded to change my mind this Autumn by a deal "you can't turn down."

It really was an irresistible proposition: 10 days in Panama, three of them aboard a private yacht; touring the country by motor coach (bus) and on the boat.

First, we explored Panama City (called "Panama" by the citizens) and saw where the Panama Canal was planned and overseen in 1914. The Canal will celebrate it's centennial next year and I expect we will see some news stories about the festivities. We ate dinner one evening in a restaurant overlooking the locks nearest the Pacific side: Mira Flores Locks. We ate and watched great cargo ships, small ships, passenger ships, etc. pass through. Ken and I had made this voyage on a passenger ship 12-15 years ago but all I remembered was muddy walls of the inside of the locks.

We spent several nights in a resort in the middle of the country, in a cone of an extinct volcano. Later, we spent several more nights in a resort in the rain forest. Such a variety of areas!

We boarded our passenger boat—24 of us including our guides. Great facility, wonderful food, very nice crew. We were welcomed on the bridge anytime we weren't maneuvering through traffic or narrow passages.

We began our water transit of the country on the Pacific Side. We traveled only during the daytime and tied up in lakes every night. We sometimes took small boats to tour along the shores, especially in Gatun Lake which is enormous.

We finally reached the Atlantic whereupon we boarded our "land yacht" (motor coach) and started back to Panama City. On the way we stopped at the site of the new locks—Gatun Locks. Larger and larger freight ships want to traverse the canal and they are just too wide and too long. So they are building bigger locks!

Grandma Hattie

My grandparents were **Thomas Henry Bailey** and **Hattie Fry**. Unfortunately, Thomas died in 1943 when I had just passed my ninth birthday. After he died, it was only **Grandmother Hattie Fry Bailey** that we concentrated on. She had a fun side - like the time Connie Benjamin came to visit and they sat at the piano in the living room and while Connie played they both sang and laughed and told stories of growing up and their experiences in those times that were happier for them then. It made a happy and interesting afternoon.

Grandmother's routine every day was to rise at 6:00 am, get dressed and begin to set everything up in her kitchen before the rest of the family was up. Then, weather permitting, she would get her broom and sweep the porch and sidewalk to the street and property lines in both directions. Hattie was about five feet tall and weighed about 100 pounds - dripping wet! She always had a head of white hair. Once the chores were done, she came back into the kitchen and made breakfast for the family (and guests) so the day could begin and she could get a bite before her other tasks would start. If there were more folks in the house than there were beds, there were pallets on the floor to be picked up and stored, or washed, until needed next time. After early chores were done Hattie would get her 'good' dress on - and earrings.

Then there was washing, baking, ironing, groceries to be bought and brought home and stored away. (Since Ida and Ira were the oldest (twins), they often got to help out with household jobs that needed extra labor). Over the years, (before my time), there wasn't always ample money from Thomas' jobs to cover expenses. Tom was a fine carpenter doing "finish/trim" work on housing and some larger construction jobs. Occasionally there was a mismatch between the project start, construction and 'finish' parts and so paychecks would be sparse until finish carpenters were needed. When the kids were old enough they would get

jobs to earn money to "fill in" their budget while Tom was 'in between jobs'. Of the five children in the household, my father was the youngest, and **Lawrence**, liked this idea least of all. He promised himself that when he got a family, his kids wouldn't have to work to support the family income and buy groceries. And we didn't! (The problem was that Dad was always working).

In Lawrence's (my Dad) notes I found (after he passed away in 1999), that he recorded some neighborhood gossip that was around before Thomas and Hattie got married to the effect that they all were not sure that Mr. Thomas Bailey was quick enough to 'catch' that Hattie Fry chick! (Where that came from, I do not know).

For all the years I knew my Grandmother Hattie, I never heard her say a single four letter word. Not one, no matter what the aggravation. She had a look and when that look came to her face - well, you just knew you had 'stepped one too far'. She was a sweet and kind lady from the "Victorian Age" when she grew up. It seems ironic she had five children, including one set of twins!

She looked like she was frail, but she was as tough as nails. For many, many years she washed at least once a week with her 'MAYTAG' and hung everything up to dry by hand. No automatic anything - wash, dry, bake or anything else, no sir. Seldom did anybody shop groceries for her. When Saturday night came she set everything out for Sunday at church! It might be Tisdale or most likely First Methodist in Winfield. She attended no matter the weather, she didn't miss attending. All her children went, too.

I once got hurt in an auto accident (1927 Model T Ford) in front of her house, and went in her house to clean up. My face was 'scraped and bloody on one side. I thought Hattie was going to 'die'. She looked at me and immediately called my Mother (across town to tell her that I was hurt. Poor lady, I thought I was in really in a lot of trouble. Looking back on that incident, I must have startled her 'half to death'.

As I recall my memories of Grandmother Hattie, I am amazed that I didn't take the time to sit and talk with her just to learn about her life growing up. I think I would

have expanded my understanding of her and Tom and the family she so successfully nurtured.

I enjoyed Marlin's memories of Grandmother Hattie, too. I've thought of a few other things to add and a question maybe someone can answer.

The question: Hattie was born in Feb. 3, 1874 in Iroquois Co., III. And died Jan. 26, 1965 in Winfield, KS. I have never heard when or why they came to Kansas. I have always assumed her parents (**Joseph Fry** and **Elizabeth Rorick Fry**) made the move and that she was still just a girl.

They lived in the Tisdale, KS area on a farm and that is where she met Granddad (Thomas Henry Bailey). I also assumed it was the same reason many moved west in those years--cheaper farm land.

We (the **Walter Bailey** family) lived 5 blocks from Grandmother and Granddad so it was easy to walk or ride our bikes over to visit. Grandmother taught me to whistle. She also helped me with embroidery, And we sang songs: "The Daring Young Man on the Flying Trapeze", "My Bonnie Lies Over the Ocean" as well as hymns. I remember one day many of the family were at Grandmother and Grandad's, as frequently happened on Sundays or Holidays, my sister, Janet, was about 2 and already liked to sing. She stood on a small stool in front of the front door and sang a song. When she finished, she said, "Now everybody clap."

Grandmother died just short of her 91st birthday. My last memory of her was when she was in the hospital. When I came into her room, she was lying on her side and rubbing her hip. I said, "What did they do, give you a shot?" She gave a little laugh and said, "Yes." She died later that night.

Thanks for triggering memories.

Frey Brothers Move to California

A few months ago Ralph Barker sent me images of the brothers, **Enoch W.** and **George N. Frey**. Mr. Barker had visited my tree on Ancestry.com and saw that the brothers were included. He kindly shared the two photos, which also include one of his ancestors. The photos stimulated my interest in learning more about these Frey cousins' lives and the settings of the photos.

Enoch Frey (23 Apr 1874 – 1939) and George Newton Frey (23 Jan 1877 – 25 Jun 1964) were born to George Dressler or Tressler Frey (1825 – 1900) and his second wife, Mary Elizabeth Shirk (1838 – 1925). Both parents and their four children were born in Pennsylvania. George, a farmer in Delaware Twp., Juniata County, PA, and Mary Elizabeth were married about 1870.

In 1900 Enoch and George N. were farm laborers living with their parents and sister **Mae** (May or Mary), born 1873. Another daughter, **Jemima** (1871 - ?), was in the 1800 census but is lost to further follow-ups. Father **George D**. died in 1900.

According to the city directory of 1902, Mary Elizabeth and her three youngest children were living on Logan Ave. in Pasadena, CA. Enoch was then working as a lineman and continued in that work until 1920 according to the censuses, his World War I draft registration, and the Pasadena city

directories. Pay records from 1915 – 1919 of the Pacific Electric Railway list him as a line foreman in the City Division..



The photograph of the "Pacific Co." line construction and maintenance car was titled "Enoch Frey and Crew." Unfortunately, Enoch is not specifically identified. The photo was taken in relatively flat land along foothills of the mountains. The powered trolley car dates from the first third of the twentieth century

In the 1916 California voter registration, Enoch was married to **Bernice L. Frey**. By September 1918 on his draft registration, he lists his mother as next of kin. In the 1920 census he is divorced and in the 1930 census he is a widower.

City directories from 1923 – 1938 list Enoch's employment as tree surgeon or pruner. No record of him exists after 1938. The 2007 HFFA Links book records his death date as 1939.

Enoch and **Bernice** had an adopted daughter, **Vivian Lucille Frey** (1915 – 2012), who married **John Miles** of Idaho. Vivian's obituary states her Frey parents were divorced when she was very young. She spent her early years in Montana, Washington, and Idaho with her mother.

In 1909, **George Newton Frey** married **Thelma Dorothy Summers** (1880 in Illinois – 1932 in California). By 1910 he was also a lineman and worked on the Mountain Division of the Pacific Electric Company. His pay records also exist from 1915 – 1919. Like Enoch, he was a tree pruner 1923 – 1939. By 1940 he had moved to San Bernardino, CA with his daughter and only

known child, **Thelma D.** (1911 – 1989). In 1940 he was doing odd gardening jobs.

George married a second time (1952) to **Mabel Ida Dawson** (1884 – 1977). He died in San Bernardino in 1964.



In our next photo, the image of the four men is captioned "unknown, Geo F Barker, Geo Frey, unknown – Mt Lowe Crew". Note Barker is wearing the climbing spikes of a lineman. Also note the rugged terrain, which would likely be on the Mountain Division of the trolley line.

The Mount Lowe Railway, built by Professor Thaddeus Lowe of Civil War military observation ballooning opened in 1893 and was completed in 1898. The system was constructed to connect the Los Angeles area to a resort he built on the summit of the San Gabriel Mountains to the north of the LA basin. The line went from Altadena to the top of Echo Mountain and to the base of Mt. Lowe. The first portion of the ascent was the Mountain Division via a standard gauge trolley for seven miles. Next was a cable car trip to the top of Echo Mountain. The final ascent was by narrow gauge trolley to a height of 4995 feet. Resort facilities included lodges, casino, dance hall, zoo, and an observatory. Mule rides were offered through the mountain scenery.

The railway was financially insolvent and was eventually incorporated into the Pacific Electric Company, which ran trolley service in the Lost Angeles and Orange County area into the 1950's.

The Mt. Lowe line closed in 1938 after a series of fires and storms destroyed and wrecked the facilities and tracks. The Mt. Lowe Railway was placed on the National Register of Historic Places.

To complete the genealogy of this twig of the Frey Family tree: **Mae** (1873 – bet. 1936-1940) married **Harry M. Shirk** in 1901 or 1902. Harry (1863 – 1945) was a Pennsylvania-born-cigar maker. He shared a same last name as Mae's mother, but no direct relationship has been found. Harry was registered to vote in California in 1893.

To **Mae Frey** and **Harry Shirk** were born three children: **Lloyd R.** (1902 – 1971) who worked for the Santa Fe Railroad, **Mary Elizabeth** (1903 – 1967), and **Mabel I.** (1905 - ?. **Lloyd** married **Dorothy K.** (born 1903 in Ohio – died 1970 in Los Angeles).
